PRINCIPAL'S message



Bass has been buzzing in Term 1 with various events and challenges taking the focus and attention of our school and leadership team. Cultural events such as International Women's Day, Lunar New Year, Ramadan and Harmony Day each celebrate events significant to our school community. We have held celebrations within our school to acknowledge these special cultural and religious events.

A few weeks ago our Year 7 and 9 students completed their NAPLAN assessments. This means that our school will be able to use the data provided to work on areas of literacy and numeracy to support the learning processes of our students. In 2024, we will continue working on the vocabulary and reading comprehension strategies that we began last year. Our staff will continue building these strategies into their teaching and learning practices and programs to ensure students gain meaning and understanding from the texts used in their classes. Ms Sheringham is leading this process with a team of staff in consultation with department experts to ensure these practices become common across the school.

We are continuing to work with the department's Human Resources to fully staff the school. Our student numbers have grown to 781 which has increased our teacher entitlement a little. We are still attempting to secure staff in the areas of Science, HSIE, English, PE, Technology and Special Education in addition to finalising three Head Teacher positions. The teachers that are filling these positions temporarily have been doing a wonderful job and we are grateful to them for enabling our students to continue their learning.

Our HSC results in 2023 were an improvement on the previous year. Our school ranking according to the Daily Telegraph improved on our 2022 position by 172 places. To assist our Year 11 and 12 students we have purchased the Atomi learning resource that provides them with short videos on all topics of the HSC courses they study. This resource provides them with short tests and teacher access where class activities can be developed for senior students.

Our Deputy Principals have been busy running projects and working with the faculty groups and students groups that they supervise. Ms Peake has Years 7 and 11, Mr Dimech Years 8 and 10 and Ms Sheringham Years 9 and 12. The Year Advisers however are the first point of contact for student wellbeing issues with Ms Bekric Year 7, Ms El Kurdi Year 8, Ms Inglis Year 9, Ms Azari Year 10, Ms Trajkovski Year 11 and Ms Gogna Year 12. Subject-specific inquiries can be directed to the Head Teachers of each faculty. Bass High School office staff can direct your call when you make contact with our school.

We are continuing to monitor student use of their Yondr pouches that have been provided by Bass High School to avoid mobile phones becoming a distraction to their learning. Mobile phones continue to be confiscated and repeated student noncompliance will lead to disciplinary action.

Last week I joined 160 staff, students and family members for our 2024 Iftar dinner at Bankstown to acknowledge the importance of this cultural and religious event to a large section of our school community. In 2024 we were able to use Commonwealth Government funds to finance the dinner.

I would like to thank our school community for the support you give to our school events and for reinforcing our school and department expectations with your children. I look forward to accomplishing and implementing the plans we have for Term 2 that will help your children become better versions of themselves.

Term One has been off to an exciting start for the Deputy Principals at Bass High School. Mr Dimech has hit the ground running, working tirelessly to staff and timetable the school. He also organised the Year 7 and 12 Parent Teacher Evening that provided a valuable opportunity for teachers. parents/carers and students to touch base about student learning and progress at the start of the year.



Ms Sheringham has been busy coordinating the whole school literacy . strategy powered by the Literacy Masters Team. This initiative ensures that teachers at Bass High School are actively embedding explicit teaching strategies including vocabulary instruction into their lessons, creating whole school continuity and supporting the Ready 2 Learn Guidelines.

In Term 1, we welcomed Ms Peake into the Senior Executive. Ms Peake was previously working as the Head Teacher of Learning and Support at BHS and has in depth knowledge of our students, as well as how to support them to achieve their best learning outcomes. As mentioned in the Principal's message, Ms Peake will be working closely with the new Year 7 cohort as well as Year 11 students starting their senior study in 2024.

We have enjoyed watching new students settle into Bass High School this term and encouraging students to achieve their best through the R2L merit system. As of the start of Week 9, Year 7 is the highest achieving year group, collectively earning 1614 merits, with some students working quickly towards silver, gold and diamond status. Year 8 is currently at 2nd place on the podium, with 1305 merits and Year 11 students are in third place with 1192. The Deputy Principals appreciate that staff are proactively rewarding positive behaviour so that our students are able to celebrate their success at BHS.

We would like to congratulate students and staff on their hard work this term and hope that our community has a restful break over the holidays.



As senior students we take on greater responsibility for our learning outcomes, these learning goals help guide us throughout the lesson. approach not only enhances our understanding of the material but also fosters a deeper sense of ownership and accountability for our academic journey.

The R2L model includes a merit system where teachers reward students for improvement, growth, or achieving their best. Notably, it's inclusive, it's not just about rewarding the highest achievers; it's about recognising progress and effort at every level. Whether a student overcomes challenges, shows perseverance, or demonstrates dedication, the merit system celebrates their efforts.

Many junior students informed us that they find the R2L merit system highly motivating. Recognising and appreciating our classroom efforts which in turns encourages us to step out of our comfort zones, tackle challenges, and pursue learning continuously.






When we receive two or more merits each week we would become eligible for the R2L lucky dip. At each School Assembly, one junior student and one senior student are randomly selected to receive a \$30 gift card in recognition of their positive learning efforts. Furthermore, as students progress through the merit ladder—silver, gold, and diamond—our R2L Coordinator, Ms Ge, arranges a Reward Day to honour and celebrate their achievements even further.

Overall, the R2L merit system plays a vital role in promoting a positive and supportive learning culture within our school. By celebrating progress, growth, and achievement, it fosters a sense of community, motivates students to excel, and ultimately contributes to our collective success.





NAPLAN

During Term 1 the Bass High School Learning and Support Team organised and facilitated NAPLAN for Year 7 and Year 9 students across many learning spaces including the hall, library and the Junior Learning Space.

The National Assessment Program Literacy And Numeracy (NAPLAN) Online assessments were run during Weeks 7 and 8 of Term 1. NAPLAN Online consists of four assessments in the areas of Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language, and Numeracy.

NAPLAN Online provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and areas that require more focus within the school. The assessment provides insight into how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one part of a school's assessment and reporting process and does not replace ongoing assessments made by classroom teachers about academic achievement.

One of the benefits of NAPLAN Online is that it presents questions of higher or lower difficulty depending on the student's performance during the exam.

On Wednesday of week 7, Year 7 and Year 9 sat the writing component of NAPLAN which went for 42 minutes. This year they were asked to write an imaginative text that included a window. They were given planning time to brainstorm and organise their ideas. The students were required to use laptops to type up their stories.

Throughout the rest of the time students sat Reading, Language Conventions and Numeracy. We organised and facilitated approx. 120 Year 7 students and 136 Year 9 students to complete these exams. Catch-up sessions were conducted for students who were absent on the day of the original exam. These catch-up sessions were facilitated in the hall and the Junior Learning Space.



LIBRARY

The library team have been busy supporting the Year 7 students who undertake the Renaissance Reading Program to begin working towards improving their reading skills over the course of 2024

The initial test analyses the students' reading level gives us an approximate reading age and suggests a book level range that will encourage the students to improve their skills.

It doesn't stop there, once a student finishes a book they take a "Book Quiz" and gain points. Students are retested 2-3 times throughout the year to track their progress.



In term 2, 11 students will participate in the Personalised Care course that focuses on person-centred support services to individuals with unique needs and preferences.






