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PRINCIPAL'S message

Term 3 was a term of progress where Year 12 students sat their Trial examinations and Year 11 are about to complete their final examinations. Student literacy has developed through the team of department experts that work alongside our school to improve student reading skills in the area of audience, purpose and vocabulary. Macquarie University and their Ambassadors have been working with our Year 7 students to improve and develop their literacy skills.

Staffing continues to remain one of our biggest challenges. We currently have panels for six teachers along with vacancies for temporary teaching staff. Across NSW there are 850 vacancies for High School Teachers across a number of different teaching areas. I am hopeful that we can encourage more local community members to undertake teacher training to ensure we can meet the learning requirements and needs of our current and future generation of students.



We have school projects in the pipeline that includes renovating the girls toilet block, two new basketball courts with an outdoor roof to one or both courts. The hall is being refitted with two audio visual screens to improve the quality of presentations and performance viewing at whole school ceremonies and award days. A new design for the front of the school is being drawn up that includes accessible entry for parents and families with wheel chairs and prams.

During the term our welfare team have been busy promoting various social issues and topics such as the dangers of vapes, Jersey Day that supports organ donation, Fathers Day and R U OK day. I was touched by the account of a lady at Bass Hill Plaza that was handed chocolates as part of our Fathers Day community project. She mentioned that she had recently lost her father and through this student act was reminded of him giving her sweets in her younger years.

We have been fine tuning our school's mobile phone policy and procedures in readiness for Term 4 implementation. This draft policy will be discussed at our P&C meeting 6pm Thursday 7th September at Bass High School in the teachers common room. Students have been made aware that it is being reviewed and they will be notified of the changes during assembly and Year meeting times before the end of this term. The new school suspension and expulsion procedures has been released in draft for Principal feedback and comment.

Bass High School has been a busy place this term and I would like to thank parents and carers for your participation with parent teacher night, our Year 11 subject selection night, NAIDOC Day and the times you attend our school to make enquires and resolve student issues. This school benefits from a strong home and school partnership.

Our students have strong support structures available to them through the Senior Learning Centre and various well-being and tertiary programs available to enable them to push through the challenges of their senior schooling.

Students will continue to be expected to use the Yondr mobile phone pouches and will be asked to place them into their pouches. As Year 12 prepares for their final HSC exams, our faculty would like to share some tips with our students to equip them with study strategies for success.



The Tomato Technique

It can often feel that there are too many tasks we need to complete and never enough time to complete them. Try the 'Pomodoro' (tomato) technique to help you manage your time and break up your study into smaller, more manageable chunks.

Here's how it works:

- 1. Choose a task you need to complete.
- 2. Set a timer and work on that task for 25 minutes, with no distractions.
- 3. When the alarm sounds, take a 5-minute break.
- 4. Repeat the process 3 more times.
- 5. Take a longer 30-minute break to reward yourself and then start again.

Make it Memorable

Reading and note-taking are not always the most efficient tools for remembering your content. Find active ways of learning that suit you. You might like to try out any of the following techniques:

- Rewrite content in your own words.
- Make flash cards with drawings to aid your memory.
- Talk it through! Start discussions about your content.
- Teach your content to anyone and everyone your family, your friends, your cat, your bedroom wall! If you can teach an idea or complex problem to someone in plain terms, you have understood it and will remember it well.






Teamwork Makes the Dream Work

Allocate some of your study time to revising with friends. Stay focused, and remember that supporting your friend and helping them revise will improve your own understanding and memory.

Practise Makes Progress

One of the best ways to prepare for exams is to practise with past papers or sample questions. This will help you become familiar with the exam format and the types of questions you will be asked. Try completing questions under exam conditions, and spend time reviewing your answers after the timer is up. Doing this with a friend, as well as asking for feedback from your teachers, will boost your confidence on exam day.





Mindful Time-Outs

Stress is a common experience, especially around exam periods. Reflect on what helps reduce your stress and make time for at least one of these activities every day.

It is highly recommended that Year 12 CAFS and PDHPE students take advantage of Edrolo and Atomi in their preparation for the HSC exams. The Edrolo and Atomi subscriptions (purchased by the school for Year 11 and 12 students) are an excellent resource to assist students when they are revising the syllabus content. It is recommended that Year 12 students watch the teaching videos, use the topic quizzes regularly as part of their study routine and practice writing extended response questions to further prepare for the HSC exams.

In Years 7 - 10 in theory lessons, the PDHPE faculty has been working with the SSS team (Strategic School Support team) to focus on embedding a literacy focus on "Reading - Audience and Purpose" in the theory units. The assessment tasks being completed by Years 7 - 10 will give students the opportunity to design infographics on a variety of topics ranging from Water Safety to Mental Health aimed at a teenage audience.




TEACHING & LEARNING

Year 7 students are working hard on their Renaissance Reading program during their Literacy lessons in the Library with Mr Davies. YEAR 12 TRIAL HSC EXAMS & PROVISIONS


During Weeks Three and Four of Term Three, the Year 12 cohort sat their Trial HSC Exams in the hall.

At Bass High School, we strive every single day to ensure that students have an opportunity to have their voices heard. This includes educating young people about mental health and helpful ways to respond to a mental health challenge within themself or a friend. Currently, the Student Support Officer is coordinating the roll out of the **Teen Mental Health First Aid** training to year 7 and eventually all other respective grades. The outline of the course is as follows:

Session 1: Discuss mental health problems in general, and understand how common and disabling these can be for young people.

Session 2: Students learn about professionals who can help and explore the Action Plan 'Look, Ask, Listen, Help your Friend'.

Session 3: Students practice the action plan and encouraged to get an adult to help.







The Welfare Faculty also coordinated a wellbeing campaign to raise awareness about the impact of vaping. Students were able to chat with Welfare Staff about the consequences of vaping and the reality of the ingredients that were found in vapes such as nail polish remover, cleaning products and other poisonous substances.

AREAS IMPACTED BY NATURAL DISASTERS

LIBYA

DERNA, Libya (AP) — Search teams combed streets, wrecked buildings and even the sea Wednesday to look for bodies in a coastal Libyan city where the collapse of two dams unleashed a massive flash flood that killed at least 5,100 people.



The Mediterranean city of Derna has struggled to get help after Sunday night's deluge washed away most access roads. Aid workers who managed to reach the city described devastation in its center, with thousands still missing and tens of thousands left homeless.

MOROCCO

Across the mountain range that stretches through Morocco to the south of Marrakech, thousands are digging through the rubble of last week's devastating earthquake.

The magnitude-6.8 quake struck near Oukaïmeden in the High Atlas Mountains, about 75 kilometers southeast of the capital.

Three aftershocks followed, and more than 2,900 have been confirmed dead, with that number expected to rise.


Stay Tuned for Polynesian Night! 15 November 2023
